On August 19th there were 131 professional, academic and enterprise members in the Toledo chapter, and today, September 27th, despite 3 new members in the same period (Robert Groves, Matthew Porman and Kevin Gall) our membership total is down to 123, a net loss of 8.

Last month I wrote about the member survey I had sent to those who had been members in December 2007 but were no longer showing as Toledo members in June 2009, there were only 7 respondents from a possible of 48 so no new information from that sector, I also wrote that I would be contacting members who had not renewed membership or whose renewal was coming up. I have made some progress on that front though not all encouraging.

Some of the former members who had not renewed explained that in prior years their employer had either paid or refunded membership, with the recession this was an expense that had been cut, other members told me they had considered the cost of their membership and decided that despite the benefits of membership they would use the money elsewhere, I understand these decisions and I do expect to have similar conversations in the coming months. On a more positive note 5 of the people I contacted did say they would be rejoining and one told me another member of the company would be joining so not all is doom and gloom.

Please tell me what will make you decide to continue your APICS membership when it comes up for renewal or alternatively what do we do or not do today that would make you decide not to renew.

Education Report October 2009

I am happy to announce that the Toledo chapter of APICS is planning to offer the first module of the APICS CPIM certification review course - Basics of Supply Chain Management. The tentative start date for this class will be Thursday, October 1, 2009. The class will be held at the Betco Corporation on Nebraska Avenue in Toledo Ohio. A minimum number of enrolled students will need to be needed for the class to be offered.

Attached is a class registration form that will provide you more details about the class. Below is a summary of the class that will be offered.

Basics of Supply Chain Management

This module covers the basic concepts in managing the flow of materials in a supply chain from suppliers to customers.

BSCM introduces supply chain concepts and emphasizes basic terminology but it also covers relationships among activities in the supply chain.

The class provides an introduction for supply chain management personnel and gives basic definitions for planning and controlling the flow of materials into, through, and out of an organization. It explains fundamental relationships among the activities that occur in the supply chain from suppliers to customers.

BSCM is divided into four major areas:

- Material Requirements Planning

A visit to the Oktoberfest in <u>Munich</u>, <u>Germany</u> means stepping back in time to the days of endless beer and almost non-stop revelry.



When is Oktoberfest? This year — from September 19th to October 4th 2009 — Oktoberfest is a 15-day extravaganza of beer, wursts, pretzels, traditional drinking songs and, of course, more beer.

The focal point of the big event are the giant tents of the major German Oktoberfestshops, known to locals as "D' Wies'n". They include the <u>Haufbrau</u>, <u>Hippodrom</u>, <u>Hacker-Festzelt</u>, <u>Schottenhamel</u>, <u>Ochsenbraterei</u>, and <u>Fischer Vroni</u>, among others.

The first Oktoberfest actually began as a wedding celebration for Crown Prince Luitpold I and Princess Theressa of Bavaria on October 17, 1810. A large meadow in Munich was taken over as the royal reception site and featured a horse race, music, dancing, singing -- and lots and lots of beer drinking.
